Live Your Faith

We each have a vocation and state of life. We are young, old, and somewhere in between. We are single, married, parents. We are consecrated religious, others are ordained. How do we live our Catholic faith out in the world? Here we offer some ideas and suggestions to influence our world or make a difference in the lives within our community by simply living our faith.

Support the Becoming Catholic program with prayer & welcome

Participating in Faith Formation is an active way of living our Catholic faith. We have people who are exploring and learning about our faith through the Becoming Catholic program. These individuals are called inquirers. In the Rite of Acceptance (for the unbaptized) and the Rite of Welcome (for those baptized in another faith tradition), the inquirers make a public commitment to their continued conversion and learning. During the rite, the parish commits to praying for and supporting those in the Becoming Catholic program. What does that look like in this time of distancing, masking, and limited group meetings? Greet the inquirers and welcome them with smiling eyes or a wave. Pray for them. Have more time or desire for greater involvement? Consider one of **these roles** that include small group ministries to extend a warm welcome to those journeying. Meet the Saints

One of the beautiful things about our faith is the saints. As Catholics we respect and honor the saints and consider them to be heroes of the Church. The saints are timeless examples of how to live a Christian life, providing endless hope. Not only were they sinners who kept trying to grow closer to God, but they also exemplify ways a person can serve God. The Church emphasizes that they were ordinary people from ordinary families and they were totally human. We will highlight a different saint each month of Together in Faith.

St. Teresa of Calcutta

Nun and missionary, Mother Teresa, now known as St. Teresa of Calcutta, devoted her life to caring for the sick and poor. Born on August 26, 1910 in Skopje, Macedonia, she

joined the missionary order of the Sisters of Loreto in Dublin, Ireland at age 18. Shortly afterwards, Sister Teresa, while praying, felt "a call within a call". She left the convent and consecrated herself to helping the poor in the slums of Calcutta, India by living among them. Volunteers came to join her and this small group of women started the Order of the Missionaries of Charity. For the next several decades, Mother Teresa worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor. Her love knew no bounds, nor did her energy as she crisscrossed the globe, pleading for support and inviting others to see the face of Jesus in the poorest of the poor. Mother Teresa passed away on September 5, 1997, at the age of 87. In 2003, the publication of her private letters revealed that Mother Teresa suffered a crisis of her faith during the last 50 years of her life. In one of her letters she wrote, "Where is my Faith? Even deep down right in there, is nothing, but emptiness and darkness. My God, how painful is this unknown pain. I have no faith. I dare not utter the words and thoughts that crowd my heart and make me suffer untold agony." Yet she continued to serve the Lord by serving the poor. She was canonized by Pope Francis on September 15, 2016.

During this time of the pandemic, you may have suffered or doubted where God is. We chose to highlight St. Teresa of Calcutta as an example of someone who has persevered through suffering. St. Teresa said, "What we need is to love without getting tired. How does a lamp burn? Through the continuous input of small drops of oil. What are these drops of oil in our lamps? They are the small things of daily life: faithfulness, small words of kindness, a thought for others, and our way of being silent, of looking, of speaking, of acting. Do not look for Jesus away from yourselves. He is out there; He is in you. Keep your lamp burning, and you will recognize Him." Even though we may doubt or wonder if God is there, He is. He wants us to wait and prepare because the gift of eternal life with him awaits us. We just need to keep that light burning inside us. St. Teresa of Calcutta, Pray for Us!
