What should you expect?

You should expect to be welcomed into our community, to meet Jesus in and through others, to grow in your understanding of the Catholic faith and to deepen your own personal spiritual life, even if you choose not to become Catholic.

You should also expect to...

- be warmly welcomed and accepted by members of our faith community.
 - be treated with respect and understanding at all times.

- have your previous religious and spiritual experiences sincerely valued.

 be clearly informed about all aspects of formation and opportunities for participation in the our faith community.

 make your own free choice about your continued participation and eventual membership in our faith community.

 be guided, encouraged, and supported in making and explaining to others your decision to join the Catholic Church.

They devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, and many wonders and signs were done through the apostles. (Acts 2:42-43)

What's the next step?

If you are interested in becoming Catholic, visit with a trusted friend or spiritual guide about your decision. Talk to someone you know who is an active Catholic. 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How do people join the Catholic Church?

St. Francis of Assisi welcomes individuals or families who are interested in joining our Catholic faith community.

Unbaptized Persons

Those who have never been baptized will follow the *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)*.

Baptized Christians

Those who have been baptized and raised in another Christian faith community and desire to follow Jesus in the full communion of the Catholic Church will receive appropriate instruction and make a public profession of faith.

Baptized Adult Catholics Baptized adult Catholics who have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation will follow an individualized path.

About Marriage and Initiation Individuals who have divorced and remarried may enter the *RCIA*, but will need to receive an annulment before celebrating initiation.

Individuals who have divorced but not remarried may enter the *RCIA* and celebrate initiation in the Church. An annulment is necessary before entering a second marriage. What is the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is modeled on the initiation ritual of the early Christian church. It is an experience of personal formation and spiritual growth which incorporates prayer, study, reflection, and discernment in a combination of public rituals and community preparations. It is the way unbaptized persons become Catholic.

Four Phases of Formation Pre-Catechumenate: a period of inquiry Catechumenate: a period of continuing formation and discernment Purification and Enlightenment: a period of final preparation and discernment Mystagogia: a period of continuing formation and reflection

Formation Sessions, Rites, Sponsors Formation sessions meet most Thursdays from 7-8:30 pm year-round. In addition to the Thursday evening sessions, participants also attend Mass weekly and meet many Sundays.

There is a series of sacred ritual rites throughout the four phases leading to a solemn public celebration of the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist. This celebration generally takes place at the Easter Vigil Mass.

Participants do not travel alone. You will have a parish sponsor and prayer partner, and others in our faith community will accompany you on your journey.

What is "Breaking Open the Word?"

Unbaptized adults who desire to become Catholic are invited to participate in Breaking Open the Word, which takes place each week during Sunday Mass. During these sessions you will discuss God's Word in the Sunday scripture readings and your personal journey of faith.

What about children and families?

Children ages 4 or younger are usually baptized without formal preparation. Parents are expected to attend a preparation class before baptizing an infant or young child.

Children ages 5-6 may be baptized following a short period of informal catechesis.

Children ages 7 or older are expected to participate in a period of formal catechesis before being baptized or making a profession of faith. This preparation includes regular participation in a parish religious formation program or Catholic school for at least one school year.
